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Chief's Report

First—a million thank yous to all the folks who worked on the Festival. Everyone had a good time and we raised money to help support the operation of the Department. We also appreciate all of you who turned out to support our community. See the article in this Ristwatch for more details.

I have been working with the Board on a couple of projects to help reduce the environmental impacts and operating costs of the department. First, PVREA generously offered to waive the upfront cost to RCVFD that allowed us to buy into the community solar garden at the landfill. The solar power will reduce the overall emissions related to our electricity use and the rate is locked in for twenty years, so this is an economic benefit to the department as well.

In addition, I have been trying to find a good LED replacement for the outside lights at Station 1. They are relatively high wattage and are terrible "glare bombs". We finally found a solution and the new lights are on order. The wattage will be reduced from 100W each to just 12W. The new lights should also go a long way toward reducing the light pollution around Station 1. It is a passion of mine to try to protect our beautiful night sky views. I don't think everyone realizes how few people can walk out in their yards at night and look up at the Milky Way.

Finally, I wrote this note for a Community Alert a few weeks back, but woke up this morning to a strong smell of smoke and gale force winds (and we still haven't had a significant rain since July), so I decided to rerun it here.

It is hard waking up to the smell of smoke from a nearby fire, record hot temperatures and the promise of a red flag day ahead. It is stressful on all of us, but particularly those of us who were around in 2012 for the High Park fire. We know all too well how ugly wildfire can get.

First, I want to say take a deep breath and take care of yourself. All of us process stress differently. It can be helpful to do things that are productive. The bonus is that if things go south you will be better prepared. I would suggest the following:

 Review your evacuation list. There is a link on <u>RCVFD.org</u> that will give you a good start.

- Review the defensible space around your house. Clean up combustibles that you have stacked out behind the garage (I am guilty). Again, there is information on our website about defensible space.
- Make a home inventory—video or photos are great for this. Do not store that information in your house, but somewhere safe (your desk at work, send to a trusted friend or store in the cloud).
- Have a communication plan with your family and friends. Know where you are going to meet if you are asked to evacuate.

The weather is not going to be our friend for a while. It is predicted to be unseasonably hot and dry for many days. I measure rain at my house and we have not had more than a few sprinkles of rain since the last week of July. Be extremely careful with anything that could create a spark. If you are out cutting firewood, take water with you so you could douse a spark from your saw if you hit a rock.

There are many places to stay up to date on local fires. LETA 911 (<u>leta911.org</u>) is a great resource for current information and you can register to receive reverse 911 calls in case we need to contact you. Another good resource for current details is the RCVFD Facebook page.

A final reminder to take care of yourself and your friends and family—and pray for snow.

















Treasurer's Report



Unsung Heroes of Pollination

While we love butterflies, bees, hummingbirds and bats, some pollinators might feel a little sad that they are not better known. But now is their moment of glory! We want to celebrate some of these unique species and help broaden the pollination conversation.



One pollinator you may not know about is Brazil's Noronha skink, which drinks the nectar of the flowers of the mulungu tree and gets pollen on its scales. It then



transports the pollen to other flowers. Scientists who studied pollination relationships between 37 species of lizards believe that most pollination relationships between them and plants take place on islands, suggesting that there are some unique ecological or evolutionary factors that make these relationships possible in isolated locations. In Tasmania, a snow skink only found there seems to have a visible co-evolutionary relationship with *Richea scoparia* plants. It is only after the skinks tear off part of the flower and eat them that insects can access the parts of the flowers used for pollination.



Tiny Crustaceans

Turtlegrass, a common seagrass, is an underwater flowering plant. In a study published in 2016, scientists discovered how tiny crustaceans in the ocean helped pollinate seagrasses, which are flowering plants. Just like on land, the scientists believe that the crustaceans move from plant to plant, getting pollen on their bodies which they then transport such that pollination can occur.

Cockroaches

Yes, cockroaches! While it's admittedly a new area of research, pollination relationships between cockroaches and plants were discovered in three countries around the world, with the latest being in Chile.

Mosquitoes

Not all mosquitoes feed on blood. Only the females feed on blood, and only when they are producing eggs. Male mosquitoes feed exclusively on plant nectar, sometimes serving as vectors for pollen transmission.

The Self-Pollinators

Who needs a friend when you can pollinate yourself? Actually, we DO like having friends. But some species such as the bee orchid, which is found predominantly in Europe, can move their reproductive parts to self-pollinate when the conditions make it necessary.

Even MORE Unsung Heroes of Pollination are Out There!

While we think we've helped shine the light on some new animals to think about when it comes to pollination, there are still quite a lot more unsung heroes. For instance, a large variety of insects like ants, beetles, moths and even spiders are pollinators. Some mammals also lend a hand (or paw), including lemurs, rodents, mongooses and honey possums—which might have one of the best animal names of all time.

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
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
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This electric driverless logging truck can carry up to 16 tons of timber Einride's T-Log will hit public roads in 2020



Swedish self-driving truck startup Einride is out with another eye-catching prototype. Much like the company's first autonomous offering, the new T-Log is all-electric and completely driverless, and it completely lacks a front cab for human drivers. But unlike the T-Pod, the T-Log comes equipped with off-roading capabilities and is designed for one specific purpose: hauling tons of gigantic tree logs. Unveiled on Thursday at the UK's Goodwood Festival, the T-Log is more powerful than the T-Pod, and it's designed to carry up to 16 tons of cargo. It can also navigate dense,

uneven forest roads, the startup claims, making it ideally suited for logging purposes.

How exactly this truck with no human driver can handle unmarked, often dirt and gravel roads is pretty interesting. Most self-driving vehicles rely on a suite of sophisticated sensors, mapping data and deep learning capabilities to handle the driving responsibilities. But even then, a majority of operators will stick to highly predictable environments, like suburban communities with robust roads and signage. (MIT recently proved that self-driving cars can successfully navigate rural, unmapped roads.)


Not Einride. The company says it is using Nvidia's self-driving software to achieve Level 4 (meaning completely driverless within a set area) driving. The trucks can also be controlled by a remote operator who is located hundreds of miles away using Phantom Auto's teleoperation technology. The use of this technology may help Einride overcome the hurdles presented by off-road driving.

The lack of a cab allows for more hauling capacity, as well as more efficiency out of the vehicle's all-electric motor, Einride says. The T-Log's 16kWh battery enables up to 120 miles of driving range. But we won't get a definitive look at the heavy hauler until 2020 when Einride says it expects the T-Log to hit public roads.

Most experts believe that the first industry to be affected by autonomous driving will be the trucking sector. What better use case for driverless technology than long-haul trucking where most of the driving is confined to the highway? But Einride has a bolder vision that includes off-roading and heavy-duty cargo.


No doubt the image of a cab-less truck will further stoke fears that autonomous technology will lead to enormous displacement in the workforce. In the US, 4.4 million jobs are related to driving; of those, trucking jobs comprise about 2.5 million. A recent study found that automated trucks could reduce the demand for drivers by as much as 50 to 70 percent in the US and Europe by 2030, with 4.4 million of the 6.4 million professional drivers on both continents rendered obsolete.

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

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
