Good riddance!

As I write this message, the year 2020 is now behind us. While this past year presented significant challenges and events arguably unprecedented in our history, there have also been opportunities for, and demonstrations of, an abundance of human kindness. Despite the cumulative impact of multiple wildfires, the pandemic and the subsequent economic toll, many of our community members and supporters of our community went above and beyond to help folks in need.

While I don't have exact numbers, I understand that RCVFD was able to surpass the targeted goal of its Annual Drive for 2020. I would consider this as being evidence of an extra measure of generosity and support from our Rist Canyon community members. I know that there were folks opening up their homes as refuge for those displaced by the wildfires; and others who have provided meals and material resources to folks who have been negatively impacted financially because of shutdowns and layoffs.

It's been truly heartbreaking to hear about the losses many of our families experienced from the wildfires. While there has been some progress with relief, I understand that some formal federal declarations have not yet been issued, exacerbating the frustration of impacted families and individuals. In the meantime, these same families and individuals provide one another with emotional and material support, while continuing to seek and obtain support through organizations, as well as engage with elected officials. Hopefully, the new year will bring all of the financial and material resources needed to assist with everyone's recovery.

Another first this past year was the very first virtual RCVFD Community Annual Meeting. Due to the pandemic, an informal poll was sent via a Community Alert to determine the preferred venue for the meeting.

Overwhelmingly, the majority of respondents wanted to hold our meeting online via Zoom. While not as personable as meeting face-to-face, we were able to conduct our formal business. Two other drawbacks to this venue were that residents without high-speed internet or a landline had difficulty participating, and there was NO pot luck, which has always been a welcome time for community fellowship! Hopefully, the 2021 Annual Meeting can be held face-to-face, without any restrictions. Stepping out with confident expectation that the pandemic will be behind us by the end of summer, H.J. Siegel, and the RCVFD "Friends of the Festival" volunteers are preparing for the 2021 Rist Canyon Mountain Festival. Chief's Report

I think we all can agree that 2020 was a very challenging year. Of course the big thing on the whole world's mind was the global Covid-19 pandemic, but here in Rist Canyon and our surrounding communities we also had the largest fire in Colorado history to contend with: Cameron Peak Fire. But Cameron Peak was by no means the only fire this year. We had near-record-breaking fires all over the Rocky Mountains, including East Troublesome, Grizzly Creek, Mullen, Middle Fork, Pine Gulch and Williams Fork, just to name a few of the biggest and nearest. Closer to home, Rist Canyon Volunteer Fire Department responded to several fires in our area, including Lewstone, Wright, Stringtown and Steadman. All except for Lewstone (and of course Cameron) were controlled while they were below an acre in size, and for that I want to thank my excellent officers and firefighters who stepped up to meet the needs of our community despite all the logistical challenges that present themselves when responding during a pandemic like we saw this year. We are having a heavy year with 82 calls, and bear in mind that Cameron Peak was a single "call". Cameron Peak generated more volunteer hours than an entire average year for us, and really put the commitment of our volunteers to the test. I am very proud of each and every one of my firefighters during this fire season. You folks are the absolute best and I am honored to work with you.

You, our community, have also stepped up by mitigating your own homes, helping your neighbors and road associations with general community mitigation, working on getting grants to help speed along the progress and the outpouring of support for our firefighters. Whether it was a tax-deductible cash donation, cooking us a meal during

Cameron Peak, offering assistance with purchases of equipment or supplies, volunteering your time to help organize or maintain all the details that keep us running, helping to publicize our efforts and needs, or just a thank-you note or an appreciative sign on your property, it all means more to us than you can imagine. We all do this because we love our community and because we want to make it a better and safer place. To see the same spirit reflected back at us from you makes everything worthwhile. Thank you.

As everyone knows by now, Cameron Peak completely devastated the Crystal Mountain area and did a lot of damage to the Upper Buckhorn, Stringtown Gulch and surrounding areas. This was especially heart-breaking because of all the hard work that had been done and was continuing to be done toward mitigation. There are no good explanations for why this home was lost or that home was spared; wildfires are fickle things, as we know from High Park. But to see a home lost when the owner had clearly worked so hard to give it the best chance they possibly could is very difficult for all of us. Please know that as we toured the area helping Larimer County Sheriff complete their damage assessments, we shed the first tears over your losses. All I can offer is encouragement: rebuild, keep mitigating, keep learning about wildfire behavior and ways to protect yourself and keep reaching out to your neighbors and get involved. We are all safer when we work together.

Stay safe, stay healthy and let's all hope 2021 is a sigh of relief from the difficulties of 2020.

Letter from the Vice President

RCVFD's Ristwatch Wish List (try to say "Ristwatch Wish List" three times quickly!)

Captain Carol Dollard reported that our RCVFD has had a busy year. We have gone on 82 calls this past year. Multi-day events like the Cameron Peak Fire and Lewstone Fire were each counted as just one call; if we counted each day on those fires as a separate call, we would have nearly 150 calls for the year.

Our usual ongoing expenses include:

- repairs on our trucks and firefighting equipment heavily used during this very active fire year
- maintenance and fuel for our trucks and chain saws
- material to be used in firefighting and medical trainings
- uniforms and safety gear for our responders
- utilities for our fire houses
- internet access
- replacing worn out hand tools for building "fire lines" to contain the spread of wildfires

Our wish list includes:

- opening up back roads for emergency exits and escape routes in our response area
- replacing an old firefighting brush truck
- rotating out expired SCBA (self-contained breathing apparatus) tanks and adding a heads up display in each face mask

- explosion proof flashlights that can be used safely in situations with dangerous gases
- drones we can use in locating and assessing severity of wildfires
- a flammable liquids cabinet for each of our fire houses
- changing our firefighting foam on our trucks to non-toxic environmentally friendly foam
- up-to-date communication radios, both vehicle mounted and handheld radios
- battery powered extrication gear ("jaws of life")

We are pleased that we received over \$117,000 in donations this year. However, we were unable to have an RCVFD Mountain Festival in 2020 due to the pandemic. In 2019, this festival raised a profit of \$20,000 for infrastructure, equipment and supplies for our RCVFD to provide emergency medical services and fire protection for over 100 square miles in Rist Canyon. We need your generous support, please, so our RCVFD can be well positioned to take care our community.


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Treasurer's Notes

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

Thanks to Jan Schoad, Erica Michel and Tom & Le Haverty for spending October 3rd with my husband Terry and me, clearing branches and brush piled up along the upper Buckhorn Road. Although the Cameron Peak fire eventually did reach this area, it didn't appear to jump the road in the places that we managed to clear. It was an impressive effort, a rewarding experience, and I truly believe we made a difference.



A few days later, Terry and I took a drive up the Buckhorn to enjoy the autumn colors before the fire made a run towards the area. That day I took a few photos of one of my favorite area landmarks, the caboose, fearing that it might not survive the approaching fire. Fortunately, it is still standing, although it was definitely a close call.

On October 14th, the fire made an aggressive run towards our area, and mandatory evacuations were reiterated. As we evacuated our horses, goats, dogs and cats, it seemed inevitable that our house would go up in flames. Once we arrived safely in town, however, we checked our security cameras and were astonished that our house was apparently still standing. We periodically checked the cameras every few hours, and couldn't believe our eyes. Terry returned the next day to feed our yaks, and confirmed that the fire had stopped about 150 yards behind our house, but there were hundreds of hot spots scattered all over our property. He spent the next few days putting out as many as he could, and the Hotshot team arrived three days later to focus on extinguishing the rest of them.



As you can see from this photo, our dogs Zeus and Delilah were eager to assist the Hotshots in this endeavor. As the fire continued to rage,

helicopters dropped water in an attempt to slow it down and keep the hotspots from flaring up.



Oblivious to all the chaos surrounding him, yet another happy and healthy baby yak was born on October 15th.



We are grateful that our little corner of the lower Buckhorn was spared, but we grieve for those of you who suffered such tremendous losses. It has been remarkable to witness how the community has pulled together to support each other in any way possible, and how quickly many people have jumped in, with hope and vigor, to the monumental task of rebuilding.

We feel fortunate to live in such an amazing community.

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
