Chief's Report

After a tremendous amount of hard work from our dedicated volunteers, we can close the books on another successful Mountain Festival. Last year we had to forego our largest fundraiser of the year because of the pandemic, so it was doubly gratifying to see the record turnout and smiling faces from community members and visitors alike. Once again the Firefighter Dunk Tank was a big hit, the Silent Auction and Used Book Sale were as popular as ever, and the large number of vendors and other booths made for lots of things to do for all ages. I would like to thank everyone who helped make this year a success, the vendors and organizations that enhanced the experience, and all the wonderful folks who came and spent the day with us. I especially want to thank everyone for their patience and cooperation as we did our best to keep everyone safe and healthy in and out of our tents.

As I write this, we have had just over 50 calls for the year so far. This is about an average load for us, and the vast majority have been medical calls, with motor vehicle accidents taking the silver medal. Covid has had a moderate effect on our call volume, but it seems that most folks who get sick are either weathering it at home or seeking non-emergency medical help. As community members ourselves, we appreciate everyone being responsible and protecting themselves and their neighbors. Please get vaccinated, folks, it could save your life or the lives of your loved ones.

It was an easy fire season this year, with no confirmed wildfires in our area. With cooler weather

coming in, our fire attention turns to chimney fires and carbon monoxide. Make sure to maintain your chimney, keep your furnaces and other fuel-burning appliances in good repair, and move ashes outside and under a sealing cover. Ashes emit carbon monoxide for many hours after they seem extinguished, and uncovered ash buckets next to fireplaces are about half of our carbon monoxide calls. Remember, CO is invisible and has no smell, so you may not know you are in danger until it is too late. Change the batteries in your smoke and CO detectors.

Your Rist Canyon Volunteer Fire Department continues to grow and improve to serve you better. Many new recruits have joined and gotten involved, a lot of effort has been put into organizing Station 1 to make things easier to find and tidier, and we have donated some unneeded equipment to other agencies that needed it. One of our engines has been staged for the summer in the Upper Buckhorn, and will be coming home soon before freezing temperatures damage it. We have had a rescue response truck parked on Old Flowers to further improve our response time on the west side of our area, and this summer we purchased a removable water tank for it. This small tank will make firefighters in that vehicle doing reconnaissance or community outreach during a large fire safer, as they can use the water to defend themselves.

2021 has been a much better summer than 2020, but we still have a ways to go back to "normal". Keep up the good fight, and stay safe.

2021 RCVFD Mountain Festival a Big Success!

The annual RCVFD Mountain Festival was held on Saturday, September 11, 2021, to raise funds for the Rist Canyon Volunteer Fire Department. There were about 2,000 happy attendees, and a nice profit was made for the fire department (the exact amount is still being calculated as expenses are finalized and Silent Auction items are being collected by the bid winners). Over 100 neighbor volunteers worked together to make the festival happen.

This year's celebration featured a huge used book sale with thousands of books; an excellent silent auction with hundreds of items; a delicious bake sale with an amazing number of pies, cakes and more; a large plant sale with a variety of types and sizes of plants; a great RCVFD Festival T-shirt sale, with a new logo for this year plus vintage shirts from past years; over 30 craft vendors; over 25 non-profit educational booths; outstanding live musical entertainment; an old-fashioned dunk tank; firefighter demonstrations of equipment; a display of our fire trucks; an opportunity to inspect a medical evacuation helicopter; free ice cream in a variety of flavors; food trucks; kids' area with lots of

different activities, games, farm animals and a 14foot bubble machine; a memorial honoring Richard
Schmid, who headlined the fine art auction for
RCVFD for many years; a commemorative
presentation in memory of those who perished in
the attacks on September 11, 2001; and an "80+1"
birthday surprise celebration for Richard Lund,
Festival leader for many, many years and still
mentor and Treasurer for the Festival.

LETA 911/NOCO ALERT







Since 1995 Larimer County has been working to improve its 911 emergency system. The outgrowth of these efforts resulted in the formation of the Larimer Emergency Telephone Authority (LETA911, https://leta911.org/). In 2020 LETA went live with a new rebranded website, www.nocoalert.org, to support enhanced notification distribution throughout the county. These enhanced emergency notifications are compatible with landlines, mobile phones, email addresses and faxes.

The Emergency Alert System that generates messages sent through LETA911/NOCOAlerts receives data from the 9-1-1 database. This includes 9-1-1 information provided by the Rist Canyon Volunteer Fire Department. If you sign up on either of the websites listed above, you can receive alerts on your mobile phone (texts), voice calls and/or emails. Several devices may be registered to receive the notifications and you can sign up for multiple locations such as your home, child's school or that of a family member for example.

Since the introduction of www.nocoalert.org, this has been the preferred location to use to sign up for emergency alerts. If you already are signed up for LETA911, you do not need to reregister on NOCOAlert.org. Both websites also provide a wide variety of community and emergency information, although NOCOAlert is the primary spot to find information about the emergency alert system, view interactive alert maps and find additional alert details.

The alerts consist of information provided through all Larimer County agencies to quickly distribute vital life-saving information to the public. They include imminent threats to life such as severe/threatening weather, natural flooding, wildfire, Amber Alerts, missing endangered adults and police activity requiring evacuation or shelter in place.





Two Special Requests

From: Assistant Chief Carol Dollard

I would like to reach out to the community to get some help on a couple of projects.

Project 1: We could use the services of a graphic designer to make badges for our responders. It would require working with the officers to come up with a design (logo, picture and "rank" as a minimum) and then printing and getting them laminated. We can reimburse for hard costs but are hoping someone is available to donate their time to the Department for this project.

Project 2: I worked with PVREA this summer to conduct energy audits on our stations. The recommendations will help reduce energy costs for the Department and make our stations more resilient. Turns out off peak electricity is cheaper than propane, so we will install 10kW electric shop heaters at all three stations (and some fancy thermostats to make sure they only run off-peak). We just need an electrician or HVAC contractor. I am happy to discus the project if you can help RCVFD get this project done. Not looking for a freebie, but would appreciate a "friends and family" rate for the RCVFD.

Unfortunately, due to the flooding we've had this summer, they haven't been able to spend as much time by the creek as they normally do. They don't let that get them down, however, and enjoy their days napping, snacking and frolicking around the pasture.

We've had a lot of bear and mountain lion activity in the area this summer, and our dogs even managed to tree a mountain lion behind our house, right off our back deck. They're certainly good at their jobs! Although we did get some halfway decent film footage of the event, we didn't manage to get any photos. Suffice it to say that the dogs were quite proud of themselves, and the mountain lion seemed slightly annoyed when he finally jumped out of the tree and sauntered up the mountain.






