Chief's Report

As I write this, it is mid-December at the start of an extremely dry winter in Rist Canyon. We have had many Red Flag days due to the high winds and very low moisture. This in turn has extended our wildfire season: September used to be the month where we would all breathe a sigh of relief and start making plans for the winter snows. Instead, here we are in December having Red Flag days and seeing grass fires popping up around our region. In a climate such as this one, it is imperative that we all are extremely vigilant: be extra careful with home ignition sources like wood-burning stoves and the resulting ashes. In an ash bucket, embers can stay hot for up to a week – hot enough to ignite flashy fuels like dry grass outside your home. Ashes in a bucket are also a significant source of carbon monoxide, so proper handling for your own safety is important. Once removing them from the fireplace or stove, deposit them into a nonflammable container designed for the purpose that includes a tight-fitting lid. The lid prevents carbon monoxide from exiting the container, protects the ashes from winds that will feed oxygen to the embers and blow them out of the container and into the grass, and the lid also starves the embers of oxygen, which aids in the extinguishing process.

2021 was a remarkably easy year for wildfires in the RCVFD response area, making it a nice change from 2020. As for other calls, we are running at about average with 68 calls so far this year. When we aren't responding, we continue to maintain our levels of training on all the skills needed to respond, as well as increase our level of training to improve our abilities. Many of our firefighters have a significant level of experience but have not had past opportunity to certify that experience with the state and national agencies with which we are affiliated. In 2021 we have been changing that, by sending firefighters to Firefighter-1 (S-131), Wildland Chainsaw (S-212), and Portable Pumps (S-211) classes put on by

NWCG and LCES. We have also continued to work with other agencies like Poudre Canyon Fire, where we participated in their excellent automobile extraction training once again. You can view photos of that training elsewhere in this newsletter. We plan to continue and expand these training and certification efforts in 2022 to better serve Rist Canyon and to improve our interoperability with surrounding departments.

Our board of directors is mostly unchanged this year, with the exception of President. Special thanks goes to Jeff Yarberry for his years of service, and we all look forward to working with Neil Faber, who has agreed to step in as President for 2022.

Last but certainly not least, 2021 has been a great year for fundraising and grants. Our Mountain Festival did very well this year, soundly beating past years in terms of funds raised and, dare I say it, fun had by all. I would also like to once again call out Susan James, who continues to demonstrate her skills and energy in piloting grants through official channels, allowing us to make capital improvements like new firefighting equipment. We also received a very generous grant from Larimer County Long-Term Recovery Group as a direct result of our efforts on the Cameron Peak Fire – thanks go to Andy Josey for assisting with that one.

Annual Membership Meeting November 6, 2021



The 2021 RCVFD Annual Membership Meeting was held November 6th at the American Legion Hall in Fort Collins. Over 50 people attended the meeting, and a summary of the reports of the Board Officers is as follows:

Fire Chief

Chief Jeff Elsner said the department currently has 30 firefighters with five EMTs. To date, RCVFD has responded to 58 calls: 34 medical; 10 motor vehicle accidents; 11 smoke/fire; and 3 other.

Treasurer

Treasurer Richard Lund reviewed the amounts on the 11/6/21 Annual Financial Report. Lund said, "Looking into the future, RCVFD is in very good financial condition."

Ristwatch Editor

Ristwatch Editor Bridget Tisthammer reminded residents that the quarterly Ristwatch is now available on the RCVFD website, with active links and in full color. The Ristwatch now pays for itself every quarter; i.e., the cost of printing each issue is fully paid for by the advertising.

Vice President

Vice President H. J. Siegel gave a powerpoint presentation re: 2021 Mountain Festival. He said over 100 neighbors worked together to raise some \$30,000, with approximately 2,000 Festival attendees.




Tim Stratman, Stove Prairie








Bullets from the RCVFD Vice President

Where Have Our Birds Gone? Bird death events Phase 2 (5.45-8.31) Figure 3 (9.14), 231

The years of 2020 to 2021 presented unprecedented challenges for residents, human and animal, in and around the Rist Canyon area. In regard to one of these specific challenges, you may have noticed a dramatic reduction in the number of birds around your property.

The decline in the bird populations also has come to the attention of University of Wyoming Assistant Professor Dr. Di Yang, who works in the Wyoming Geographic Information Science Center. Yang headed a research group looking into the reduction in the number of various species of birds over the past year. The researchers were looking for insight into "how extreme weather and natural disasters impact bird biology, survival and migration." The study found patterns of "mass mortality events for various bird species in 12 Western states during the 2020 summer fire season."

The study relied on data and citizen

observations including environment, climate, drought, distance from the various fires and vegetation. The study's results suggest the two most significant factors were distance from wildfires and air quality. The hardest hit bird

species were geese, hummingbirds, sparrows, swallows and warblers, all of which were in the middle of migration during the most severe events.

The researchers found that "wildfires resulting in the loss of habitat and emission of particulate matter and volatile organic compounds pose serious threats to wildlife and human populations, especially for avian species, the respiratory systems of which are sensitive to air pollution. At the same time, extreme weather (e.g. snowstorms) in late summer may also impact bird migration by cutting off their food supply and prompting their migration before they are physiologically ready."

Collaborating data used in the study provided by the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish indicated that all the dead birds they studied were "severely emaciated." Local contributors to the study were the Department of Fish, Wildlife, and Conservation Biology, Colorado State University and the National Wildlife Research Center, U. S. Department of Agriculture and Animal and Plant Inspection Service in Fort Collins.

Notes from Your RCVFD Area Representatives, cont'd.






Things have been very quiet along Stove Prairie Road. This is ok by me and I hope it remains the same.
