

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RCVFD 2023 Mountain Festival Entertainment Lineup



The entertainment lineup for the 2023 Mountain Festival will feature five local favorites.

Liz Barnez and her accompanying musicians bring an eclectic style of guitar playing and songwriting to the stage, which incorporates elements of folk, New Orleans R & B, jazz, country and a hint of pop. Liz was inducted into the Colorado Music Hall of Fame as a member of the Mother Folkers in 2019. Having grown up in the French Quarter, she mixed funk with gospel, soul and Dixieland music, which led to the

creation of her signature "acoustic swamp rock" style.

Also Known As (AKA) has been part of the Northern Colorado music scene since 1996 when they played as Prairie Dog Companion at New West Fest. They play an eclectic brand of Americana music they call "City and Western." Their music has influences from Bakersfield to Cajun Louisiana and from Nashville Newgrass to Memphis Rock-A-Billy.

The Choice City Trio features riveting vocals by Alan Anderson, a Rist Canyon Resident, along with an acoustic 12-string guitar, electric bass and percussionist. They feature original music along with a variety of traditional favorites. Their method of storytelling emphasizes the significance of connection and community.

Rusty 44 is a traditional Northern Colorado five-piece band with Americana roots. They have been playing bluegrass music across the Front Range for more than five years together. Their unique acoustic style incorporates the sounds of bass, fiddle, mandolin, guitar and banjo. This combination brings an energetic, joy-filled sound to the stage.

Sunflowers and Sawdust features two familiar locals, Ron and Julie Lynam, who were previously part of the Cowtown Band. Their acoustic music is a unique blend of bluegrass, country, folk, Cajun and swing. Ron and Julie bring many years of musical experience to the stage, having toured throughout the United States and Europe. They incorporate vocals and a variety of instruments into their high energy performance. You can expect to hear original tunes and those of iconic musicians.

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Lodgepole Pines: High Park Fire Phoenixes

The 2012 High Park Fire wreaked havoc on our landscape. Now, as we approach the fire's ten year anniversary, the lodgepole pines are demonstrating first-hand their reputation for fortitude and tenacity. Already, some of the trees are pushing toward that four-foot mark. There are patches that are so dense, just navigating through them is difficult. Management now becomes important for future fire control, fire suppression, insect infestation and potential wood production.

"There is no better time than the present to think ahead in regard to how to manage your property in case of future fire events," says Rist Canyon Fire Department Chief Jeff Elsner. "Managing the location and densities of trees, particularly around your house and structures, is much easier and safer when the trees are saplings than when they reach upwards of 50 to 70 feet tall."

Colorado State University's publication, <u>Lodgepole Pine Management</u>
<u>Guidelines for Land Management in the Wildland-Urban Interface</u>¹, is available for guidance. The following information are excerpts from this publication.

Lodgepole pine forests cover slightly more than 1.5 million acres in Colorado or approximately 7 percent of the state's forested lands. Lodgepole pine is a familiar species in the montane and subalpine forests of Colorado's northern Rocky Mountains between 8,000 and 10,000 feet in elevation. (Ed. note: The ponderosa pine is native between 5,000 and 9,000 feet.) Most of Colorado's lodgepole pine forests developed following hot, stand-replacing crown fires (113°-140°F). Lodgepole pine is intolerant to shade and thrives in the aftermath of fire; many lodgepoles produce serotinous cones, which open in response to extreme heat and release an abundance of seeds. These long-lived cones may remain viable for decades waiting for a fire to release their seeds.

Thinning Lodgepole Pines

Older lodgepole pine stands generally do not respond well to selective thinning. Unlike other species, they tend not to make good use of the increased moisture, sunlight and soil nutrients available after thinning. To achieve such results, the stands must be heavily thinned. Unfortunately, selective thinning of lodgepole opens the stand to severe windthrow (trees uprooted by wind) and stem breakage. To ensure a positive response to thinning throughout the life of the stand, trees must be thinned early in their lives and no later than 20 to 30 years after germination. This investment must be maintained through periodic follow-up thinning.

Additional suggestions provided by Michael Hughes, Colorado State Forest Service, Fort Collins Field Office, NE Area, in a visit to our ranch are:

- When thinning, it is important to protect the diversity of the emerging saplings. Maintaining a good mix of species is healthy for the forest ecology and lifespan of the forest.
- When thinning, leave the saplings that appear to be the strongest, straightest and healthiest.
- Spacing the trees provides those remaining with room to establish good root and foliage systems.
- Always clip the saplings at or below ground level ensuring no green needles remain as they often will resprout.
- Aspens like full sunshine so it is best to thin out pine trees in emerging aspen groves.


Operations —1st Wednesdays (6-7 PM)

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












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
