### Chief's Report



I hope this newsletter finds you well and safe. So far this year, we've responded to 38 calls, which is just below our annual average. This is a testament to the hard work and dedication of our volunteer firefighters and first responders. Your safety remains our top priority, and we are always ready to serve our community

in times of need. Please continue to stay vigilant and remember to call 911 in case of an emergency.

Our annual Mountain Festival this year was a resounding success, thanks to your support and participation. It's events like this that help us raise crucial funds to maintain our equipment and provide training opportunities for our volunteers. We are grateful for your continued support, and our volunteers are already getting started on next year's Festival to make it just as big a success as this year.

Our next training session will focus on Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA). This equipment is vital for our firefighters to safely navigate smoke-filled environments during emergencies. We'll be ensuring that our volunteers are well-trained and equipped to handle any situation that may arise. SCBA is for more than just structure fires: we also use it in carbon-monoxide (CO) or other hazardous gas situations, as well as car fires.

In an effort to promote fire safety this winter, we are pleased to announce that we are once again giving out Chimfex devices. If you have a fireplace, please get in touch with your fire department area representative to receive your free Chimfex. These handy devices can be a lifesaver in case of chimney fires, providing a quick and effective means of suppression.

Your safety also extends beyond our immediate response to emergencies. We encourage you to

consider air medical care helicopter insurance, which can be invaluable in situations requiring rapid transport to specialized medical facilities. For more information, please reach out to your area representative or visit our website (Emergency Preparedness -> Flight for Life Membership). Don't know how to reach your RCVFD area representative? We are excited to announce that our new ambulance is nearly ready for service. This vehicle represents a significant upgrade to the sorts of medical care we can provide. It also allows us to reallocate our existing medical engine (M-14) to the western side of our response area. Expanding our coverage in this way will make our medical responses more effective and flexible.



As winter approaches, our Buckhorn fire truck will be relocating to Crystal Mountain to ensure rapid response to any emergencies in that area. We are committed to serving all corners of our community, and this move will help us do just that during the winter months. Stay safe, stay prepared and enjoy the beautiful fall season!

### Letter From the Vice President

### 2023 RCVFD Mountain Festival a Big Success!



The annual RCVFD Mountain Festival was held on Saturday, September 9th to raise funds for the Rist Canyon Volunteer Fire Department. It was a fun day and an excellent festival. We are still calculating the profit for RCVFD because there are some expenses to

come in and some Silent Auction purchasers need to pick up and pay for their items. We plan to announce the final amount of profit at the RCVFD annual community potluck lunch meeting at 1 PM on Saturday, November 4<sup>th</sup>. Based on the information we have now, I am guesstimating we made \$25,000 to \$35,000 profit for the fire department!

There were about 2,700 happy attendees. Over 130 neighbor volunteers worked together to make the Festival happen; they are listed in this newsletter. This event brought neighbors together to renew old friendships, build new friendships, inform people about the activities of RCVFD and raise money for our RCVFD fire department.

This year's celebration featured a huge used book sale with over 20,000 books; a wonderful silent auction with over 250 items; a delicious bake sale with over 100 pies plus over 1,000 smaller items (e.g., cookies, brownies, muffins); a plant sale with over 200 plants; a great RCVFD Festival T-shirt sale, where we

sold about 90 T-shirts with a new logo for this year plus about 70 vintage shirts from past years; 40 booths with craft sellers and other vendors; over 20 non-profit educational booths; outstanding live musical entertainment by five local bands; an old-fashioned dunk tank; firefighter demonstrations of equipment; a display of our fire trucks; free ice cream in a variety of flavors; food trucks; and a kids' area with lots of different activities, games and farm animals. In addition, we had over 40 generous groups supporting the festival as sponsors! The presentation at the RCVFD Annual Meeting (at 1 PM on Saturday, November 4th) will provide more information and show photographs of the event.





### Roger Dev and Marolyn Kvols named Colorado Tree Farmers of the Year

Whale Rock residents Roger Dev and Marolyn Kvols are the recipients of the Colorado State Tree Farm Committee's *Outstanding Tree Farmers of the Year* award. Their project, Forest Treatment After Fire: 11 Years Later, was highlighted on a Sept. 30 tour of their property. The award annually recognizes a Colorado tree farmer for an exceptional job of forest management on their property and promoting the importance of forestry in the state.[1]

"Here in Larimer County, we have a lot of burned acreage," said Greg Zausen, Colorado State Forest Service, Colorado State University Northeast Area Forester in presenting the award. "Roger and Marolyn have taken on the work of reclaiming their property including the failures and successes."

Optimism, a passion for a diversified ecosystem, dedication to the land, hard work and patience clearly are attributes of Marolyn and Roger's approach to their 120-acre property, which burned in the 2012 High Park Fire. According to Roger, "Buying property that has been burned has three advantages: views, you have the opportunity to redesign the

landscape, and you do not have to worry about a forest fire."

The 11-year reclamation project has included experimenting with a wide variety of deciduous and evergreen tree species as well as other plants and grasses. "Planting is only one-fourth of the effort," says Dev. "Caging to protect the trees from the deer, mulching and watering is the rest. You just can't get to everything, so every day I try to do something."

The award is presented annually by the Colorado Tree Farmers, a landowner network co-sponsored by the Colorado State Forest Service. The Colorado program is part of the American Tree Farm System (ATFS) and is an American Forest Foundation program. The ATFS is a privately funded, national tree-growing effort that encourages forest management on private lands. The ATFS is the oldest and largest forest certification program in the United States.[2]

A tree farm is defined as privately owned land voluntarily dedicated by its landowner to the growing of renewable resources, while protecting environmental benefits and increasing public understanding of sustainable forestry.[3]

Part of the mission of the Colorado Tree Farmers is to inform the public of the need for active forest management of private forested property and encourage landowners to get started. They encourage all forested property owners and anyone else interested in forest health and sustainability to attend Colorado Tree Farmer meetings, tours and events.[4]

### Colorado Tree Farmers of the Year, cont'd.



As part of the program, the Colorado Tree Farm Committee makes arrangements for professional foresters to inspect and certify tree farms. The purpose of the free inspections is to provide "on the ground"

advice to landowners and to help them meet the goals and objectives of their property. After the initial inspection and certification, tree farms are reinspected every five years. These reinspections provide an opportunity for further forestry assistance and help ensure certified tree farm properties maintain quality standards for continued membership.[5]

To qualify for the program your woodland property must be ten acres or larger; have a written and implemented plan addressing your objectives; and be managed for the sustainable production of forest products, while recognizing the importance of water, wildlife and recreational opportunities.[6]

### Create Defensible Space this Fall

It's been a great year for our forests, with lots of rain for our trees, bushes, grasses and flowers. The increased rain means our trees picked up and stored needed moisture, increased growth and became healthier. The grasses also did well this year—I saw hay fields with many more bales in them than in past years. The grass in the forests also did

well, but is now drying out and standing tall which makes for a fast moving fire if one should break out. Fire season in Colorado lasts from January 1st to December 31st, so we can't let our guard down because we had wet weather and no fires in our district (yet).


Fall mitigation is important. Mow down tall weeds and grasses; and prune overgrown bushes and low hanging branches. Remember to store firewood away from your house. 
